GLENCOE D. A. R. TO GIVE LUNCHEON AT SKOKIE COUNTRY CLUB

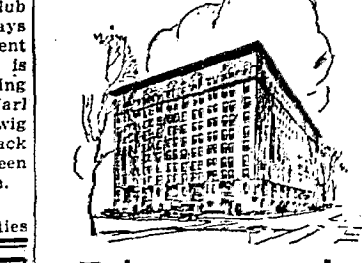
The Glencoe chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution will entertain at a luncheon at the Skokie Country club tomorrow.
